Source of online sample: Selected from previously recruited online panels of research

Positioning of voting intention questions in questionnaire? Immediately after demographics

2PP calculation method: Calculated according to preferences flows at previous elections **How were undecided voters handled?** Undecided respondents who answered "don't know" were asked a leaner question which also included a "don't know" option. Those who answered don't know were excluded from published voting intention figures but not from the survey. 5% were thus excluded from published voting intention figures.
